## Spring Clean Up Program Status

In November the City Council voted to discontinue the Spring Clean Up Program. In an effort to divert items from landfills and be environmentally responsible the City is promoting other alternatives for disposal, recycling, reuse of items. There were numerous items put out at spring clean up that could have been recycled or taken to hazardous waste drop off. Below is a list of alternatives for recycling/disposing of materials usually reserved for the Spring Clean Up Program.

**Veolia Pick-Up** – Veolia charges \$20/cubic yard of materials for pick up. Veolia will send out a representative to give estimates based on the amount of materials. Veolia: 630-587-8282

**Veolia Drop Off** - Veolia has transfer station in Batavia for a fee (\$87.00 for up to a ton of materials). There is also a free recycling drop off. The facility is located at 766 Hunter Street, Batavia 630-879-3587. The hours are Monday thru Friday 6 am – 5 pm and Saturday 6 am – 10 am.

**Kane County Electronic and Book Recycling Days** – This program takes place the second Friday and Saturday of each month from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM. **Salvation Army** – The Chicago Office will arrange for pick up of items, including furniture in good condition at 312-738-4360.

**Household Hazardous Waste Drop Off** – The nearest facility is the Naperville Fire Station #4, at 1979 Brookdale Road. (½ mile south of I-88, corner of Route 59 and Brookdale Rd.) **City of St. Charles** weekly refuse and recycling collection- Veolia will pick up large items at the curb throughout the year, provided there is a sticker on it.

## Home Energy Audits Program is Now Available on the City of St. Charles Web Site

The City of St. Charles is now providing our customers the ability to do energy audits on their homes. This web based program is provided in conjunction with our energy supplier, the Illinois Municipal Electric Agency (IMEA). Customers can access the program by logging onto our web site ([www.stcharlesil.gov](http://www.stcharlesil.gov)) and clicking on the “Home Energy Calculator” icon. The program allows the customer to enter data about the residence, calculate total energy cost, and calculate the cost and energy savings expected by making specific improvements. There is also a “Library” section for energy information and a “Fun” area for kids and teachers to learn about energy savings.

## 2010 50/50 Parkway Tree Program

The City is again offering trees for planting in the parkways through its “50/50 Parkway Tree Planting Program.” The City’s tree consultant will plant, mulch and provide a gator bag to assist with watering needs of the tree.

Trees will be planted in late April/ May. Each tree delivered is balled and burlaped with average size being 2.5” in diameter. Species may vary upon availability. Each tree is covered by a one-year warranty.

## The Top 10 Dangers of Fireplaces: What Every Fireplace User Should Know

Most people love the warmth and coziness of having a fireplace in their home, so much so that fireplace sales rose to 3.2 million units in 2005, up 50 percent from 1998, according to the Hearth, Patio and Barbeque Association. Over half of all U.S. homes (55 percent) have at least one fireplace, and they're ranked as the third most desirable feature that people look for when buying a new home. Outdoor porches and upscale kitchens rank first and second.

As you get ready to crank up your fireplace this winter season, it's important to know that fireplaces can be dangerous – accounting for a large number of home fires and emergency room visits every year. You can enjoy your fireplace while keeping your family and your home safe by avoiding these 10 common fireplace dangers.



1. Not having your flue and chimney inspected each heating season. If your flue or chimney are blocked by debris or contain cracks or leaks, inadequate venting can occur, and toxic fumes may seep into your home. Further, creosote, a by-product of burning wood, can build up on the chimney flue and lead to a chimney fire. An inspection lets you know that everything is in safe working order.
2. Forgetting to open the damper, or closing it too soon. The fireplace damper should be opened before lighting the fire, and kept open until all the ashes are cool. Closing a damper too soon, even if just the ashes are warm, can allow poisonous gasses like carbon monoxide to build up in your home. Always make sure the fire is completely out before going to bed.
3. Using charcoal in a fireplace. Charcoal should never be used in a fireplace because it can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning.
4. Not using a screen or glass enclosure. These barriers are necessary to keep sparks, rolling logs and embers from jumping out of the fireplace and starting a fire.
5. Allowing children or pets to get too close to the fireplace (or carelessly getting too close yourself). The glass barrier doors of a fireplace can reach over 400 degrees F in only six minutes, and it takes 45 minutes for the doors to cool down to a safe temperature after the fire has been put out.
6. Using gasoline, charcoal lighter fluid or other fuel to light the fire. These substances release vapors that could cause an explosion.
7. Burning plastic or other garbage in the fireplace. Burning plastic materials like cups, wraps or plates, or other trash, can release toxic gases into your home's air.
8. Not cleaning your chimney regularly. This is necessary to avoid the buildup of creosote that could cause a fire. You should not use your fireplace if your chimney is in need of a cleaning.
9. Do not burn paper in the fireplace. Lit pieces of paper can float out of chimneys and land on neighboring buildings. Also, excessive amounts of paper can burn at a high temperature, possibly igniting soot in the chimney. Only use dry wood – not wood/boughs from live-cut trees as these lit particles can also float out of a chimney.
10. Hanging decorations from your mantel. If you have decorations that hang down from your mantel over your fireplace, it's possible for a spark to ignite them and cause a fire. Make sure any decorations (Christmas stockings, garland, etc.) have been removed before lighting the fire.

# United States Census 2010

## The Census: A Snapshot

**What:** The census is a count of everyone residing in the United States.

**Who:** All U.S. residents must be counted—both citizens and non citizens.

**When:** You will receive your questionnaire in March 2010 either by U.S. mail or hand delivery. Some people in remote areas will be counted in person.

**Why:** The U.S. Constitution requires a national census once every 10 years to count the population and determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives.

**How:** Households should complete and mail back their questionnaires upon receipt. Households that do not respond may receive a replacement questionnaire in early April. Census takers will visit households that do not return questionnaires to take a count in person. With only 10 questions, the 2010 Census questionnaire takes approximately 10 minutes to complete. Households are asked to provide key demographic information, including: whether a housing unit is rented or owned; the address of the residence; and the names, genders, ages and races of others living in the household. By law, the Census Bureau cannot share an individual's responses with anyone, including other federal agencies and law enforcement entities.



## What The 2010 Census Means for St. Charles

When you fill out the census form in March, you're making a statement about what resources the St. Charles community needs going forward. Accurate data reflecting changes in the St. Charles community are crucial in apportioning seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and deciding how more than \$400 billion per year is allocated for projects like new hospitals and schools.

By supporting the 2010 Census, you will:

**\*Bring jobs to the St. Charles community.** The Census Bureau will hire hundreds of thousands of people nation wide for temporary census jobs. By recruiting applicants in our community, it will help boost local economy.

**\*Make informed decisions.** Census data is used to guide decisions on where to build roads, schools, job training centers and more. Billions of dollars in funding for these types of projects are at stake- an incomplete count could mean our community misses out.

**\*Ensure your interests are represented.** Redistricting will occur on the state and local level using data collected in the 2010 Census. The data also determines how many seats our state will have in Congress. A complete count is vital for an accurate representation.

## Key Census Dates for 2010

### March 2010

Census forms are mailed or delivered to households

### April 2010

National Census Day—use this day as a point of reference for sending your completed forms back in the mail

### April - July 2010

Census takers visit households **that did not return a form by mail**

### December 2010

By law, the Census Bureau delivers population information to the President for apportionment

### When the Weather Outside is Frightful

District 303 uses several means to alert parents of District 303 students of school closure because of inclement weather. The primary method is through an automated phone message that will be delivered by 6 a.m. In addition, notification of school closures will be posted on the home page of District 303's web site [www.d303.org](http://www.d303.org) District 303 also notifies Chicago based radio and television outlets such as Newsradio 780 WBBM, CBS2Chicago, NBC5, WLS7, WGN9, FOX32 and CLTV of school closures.

The decision to close school is based on the following criteria:

- \* Is it safe for children to be out in the weather? There are no specific temperatures which automatically trigger a decision to close school. But, special consideration is taken when actual temperatures are below zero or the wind chill falls below -20 degrees.
- \* Can children be safely transported to and from school? That is, can buses and other district vehicles start and are roads safe for travel?
- \* Can schools be operated safely? Are buildings warm? Can parking lots be sufficiently cleared of snow? Can students and staff safely get to and from buildings?

State the location of the streetlight including the house number it is in front of, what intersection or mid-block between what streets, or other locational information along with a brief description of the problem. Please also include your name and phone number so we may contact you if additional information is needed. Streetlights are typically repaired on Fridays.*
